Ten years ago on July 1, 2015, I began my tenure as the sole (though still part-time) pastor of Stone Presbyterian Church. I had been co-pastoring with the Rev. Dennis Dewey since January of that year until his retirement at the end of June.

Since that time, by my count I have officiated:

- 3 new formal members (though our total net membership has declined from ~55 in 2016 to 44 in 2024, offset somewhat by new attendees at our worship services.)
- 19 baptisms (including two of my granddaughters!)
- 13 weddings (including two of my adult children!)
- 34 funerals
- 111 pastor columns (including this one, plus six others in the first half of 2015)
- 415 worship services (plus 16 in the first half of 2015)

THE PASTOR'S



In my personal life, I picked up a marvelous daughter-in-law and another wonderful son-in-law and five more cherished grandchildren (for a total of seven). Though I thought I'd be retired from my full-time day job by now, it hasn't happened yet, despite my now being on Medicare and reaching Social Security full retirement age last month; I'm still mulling it over.

But I could not do both jobs without the full support of my wife, Helen, not only being my partner as a pastor's wife but also being active in the church through deacons, women's association, and her angelic voice in the choir. While I continue to enjoy being the pastor, it is my wife, Helen, who has borne the burden of my time commitment. While we knew Sunday mornings would be full, we didn't count on our Saturdays also being tied up a bit as I almost always don't get to writing my sermons until then. Part of it is because of my day job, but part of it is a habit I picked up in college of doing prep work during the week and then crunching on a paper into the wee hours of the night before it's due. The scary question for me is, what will be my excuse after I retire from my day job?

And, as I've mentioned in other columns, none of this would be possible without the community of Stone Church. Our common values of trying to live Christ-like lives both in our daily lives and as a community of faith is what enables us to be "the body of Christ and individually members of it" (as the Apostle Paul writes 1 Corinthians 12:27). And further we strive, as Paul pleaded, "that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it." (1 Corinthians 12:25-26). We understand when Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 12:13, "For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit", that "all" means *all*—everyone.

But we also believe, as the epistle of James 2:26 says, "For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is also dead." That is, if we have faith that should be evidenced by our good works, an organic outgrowth of the Spirit at work through us. Throughout the Bible, themes of poverty and justice are deeply woven into its teachings, appearing in over 2,000 verses across both the Old and New Testaments. These scriptures call for compassion, fairness, and a collective responsibility to care for the marginalized and oppressed. Throughout my time attending Stone Church for the past 45 years (with a couple year break in the mid-1980s) that has been our mission, to proclaim our faith through actions and not just words. Not that we are perfect or that we haven't stumbled on occasion or have not had dissension among us, but that we confess our sins, seek forgiveness, and continue, as Paul says in Philippians 3:14, to "press on toward the goal, toward the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus."

As we go forward to enjoy the summer, let us keep our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus, so that by our words and deeds we show others God's love through our love for all.

Historical Period Revisited---A Glimpse into Stone Church's Past

The Life and Career of Rev. Marge Egger Ordained June 14, 2006 At Brown Memorial Woodbrook Church in Baltimore, MD

My parents, Gordon and Barbara Young, moved to Clinton when I was 5 years old. It didn't take long to decide that Stone Church was the place where we were the most comfortable. I remember making friends on the first Sunday we were there. I remember the joy-filled atmosphere, created by the beautiful music and the loving welcome we received by the members of the church. So my parents joined the church. Because we had been part of a Baptist church in Syracuse, my older sister, Jan, my brother, Ken and I were not baptized. Mom and Dad decided that we would be baptized when were confirmed.

The next 13 years were filled with Sunday school, vacation Bible school, junior choir, youth fellowship, senior choir, learning to play the organ. My parents were active—Dad was on session. And Mom was eventually elected to session—and ordained as the first woman elder in the church. All this is to say that church was part of my DNA. I learned the faith by gentle teaching and the ethical modeling of the Christian life by members and pastors alike.

The Rev. Graham Smith baptized and confirmed me. Howard Adams encouraged me to share my musical gifts in church service. Wherever my husband and I went, I was involved in church music, as chorister, substitute organist and eventually as music director. When we moved to Baltimore I was called to a mid-sized church that had a well-established music program. It was a wonderful place to become completely ensconced in a comprehensive music program including choirs for all ages, handbells. I believe that Stone Church showed me how to do this wonderful work and I had 20 joy-filled years of directing church music.

God had other plans for me. Everything I did was in praise and glory to God. God's Spirit was quietly urging me to do more. When my husband announced his intention to attend an exploration weekend at Lancaster Theological Seminary, I decided to go too. All I can say is that when I walked onto that campus, I felt as if I had come home. Separately, we heard God's call to ministry despite the fact that we were in our fifties.

Our children were out on their own. We sold our house and moved to campus housing. Music came with me. My faith formation from Stone Church came with me. You see, you all lived into the promises you made when I was baptized—you promised to nurture me in the faith, and you did that very well. The Holy Spirit has a way of scooping up all one's experiences and one's learning and forming a person with faith and love to share.

My call out of seminary was a surprise, but not really. My mother had helped to take care of a friend who was dying from cancer. She shared her experience with me at the time. That was the seed that was nurtured by the Spirit and became my call to hospice chaplaincy. I loved the work; I loved the people I met and cared for; I loved the people I worked with; I loved sharing God's love and easing the dying into the next life.

But I never completely left my love of music in worship. Now I sing in church choirs, I plan meaningful worship that, of course, includes music. While I don't lead music programs anymore, music is as important, maybe more important than ever. That's because it informs the whole service, including the preaching. That maybe the biggest surprise of all. I love preaching, leading worship, and administering the sacraments.

My friends in Stone Church, thank you for your faithful service to the church and the world. I want you all to know that you launched me into a life of service to the church and the world. In your work, your worship, your music, your mission and your love of each other and all of God's people. I send blessings and the love of Jesus Christ to you all as you minister to the community and the world.

JULY/AUGUST 2025 MISSION

I am a list maker and have been one for as long as I can remember. Items of major import, items that would qualify as inconsequential, they all might have been part of a list at some time. (It is possible that sometimes I can't remember where I put my list, but that is different issue.) So, before I wrote this Mission article, I made a short list of ideas I wanted to be sure to share. Along the way as I was thinking more about what I wanted to say, it occurred to me that this time, I was not going to "dress-up" the list into paragraphs, but simply share the list with some brief additions. What follows is a list of ways to be conscious of the responsibilities God has set before each of us as we enjoy the more casual and relaxed summertime.

The Sunday bulletins contain a reminder of our prayer chain. Pay attention, and whether you have volunteered to be part of the chain or not, include those people in your daily prayers. No one mentioned? That's okay. You can simply look around and choose someone who is part of that day's congregation to receive special thoughts and prayers. Each of us knows that such care is never hidden. You can also save the May and June Cornerstones and refer to those issues for further inspiration.

Mary Chamberlain has done a great job of letting us know who needs to receive cards. Don't assume that one card does the job. Periodically send cards to those who are ill, are recuperating, or bereaved. Or make a phone call. It need not be an hour long conversation. Sometimes just the thought that someone is really checking on you is incredibly gratifying.

Cards can also be sent just for fun. Whether it be a birthday, a holiday, or something silly that showed up on Google such as "Today is national Marshmallow Toasting Day."

Additionally, during *Joys and Concerns*, pay further attention so you remember the person who brought the Joy or Concern to the congregation. Checking with them a few days later to see if there are changes reinforces the idea that someone truly was listening as they revealed something important to them.

Two of our main mission activities are Hope House and the Country Pantry. During the summer the careful reminders regarding their wishes don't always occur. Remember, there always is a list of items requested or you can choose items you think are appropriate. You can simply bring an item with you on any Sunday. If it is hard to make the physical effort to carry something into church, put a check or cash in a clearly marked envelope and include it in the collection plate. Don't worry: any donation is wonderful, regardless of size. Janice will keep track of the money and, as appropriate, make sure the funds are sent.

Also, don't forget that The Country Pantry and Hope House love volunteers. If you think you might be willing to help at either place, talk with Judy LaGasse regarding The Country Pantry and Lora Schilder regarding Hope House. They both are knowledgeable and helpful and will be able to address your questions and concerns.

The Fair Trade Shop is a fundamental mission for Stone Church. Don't forget to shop there over the spring and summer when the shop tends to be basically quiet. Wedding presents, hostess gifts, birthday presents, party favors, cards and so forth can all be easily found at the shop. You will have such an interesting variety from which to choose. Plus you can tell your neighbors and friends about the treasures you found.

And speaking of the Fair Trade Shop, if you find you have extra time, consider volunteering to work at the Fair Trade Shop. You won't be left alone in a panic and you will have a great opportunity to be busy, help others and promote our wonderful shop.

The finale of this list is a couple of activities we will be undertaking in the fall. In mid to late September or the beginning of October, we will be having a Saturday cooking day for **Your Neighbors**. Think about your preference for accomplishing this in a way that maximizes the amount of food we will package for the freezers at Zion Church. When we return after our summer, hopefully we can enjoy after worship coffee and decide how we would like to manage this project.

Another fall activity will be to continue with our Lunch and Learn activities. We will start with a program highlighting the history of some area of our church building and will want to continue with other programs. Suggestions? Volunteers? Possibilities? It has been suggested that it would be great if we could have a program that other churches would find of interest but I do not want to restrict ourselves by thinking solely about that eventuality. Again, in September we will gather to discuss possibilities.

Have a wonderful June as we continue our Mission opportunities and await the joys of summer. And don't forget your list of all the possibilities which accompany the upcoming summer.





THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

The group is responsible for managing memorial gifts, recommending uses for undesignated funds and ensuring contributions are used in accordance with the wishes of the contributors or family often within a church or organization.

Managing Memorial Gifts: Memorial Committee oversees the administration of memorial gifts, keeping records of contributions and ensuring they are used appropriately.

Recommending Uses for Undesignated fund: Committee makes recommendations for how undesignated memorial funds should be used, often in consultation with the Pastor or leadership.

Recognizing & Distributing Gifts: The Committee will play a role in recognizing & distributing gifts in memory of members & friends. Ensuring compliance with donor wishes. The Committee works to ensure contributions are used in accordance with the wishes of the contributors or family of the deceased.

Maintaining Records: They keep records of gifts and memorials to the church.

Consulting with families: They may consult with families about appropriate memorial.

Planning Memorial Services/Events: The committee may also be involved in planning memorial services or other memorial or events to honor the deceased.

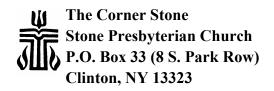
