## ***The Long Night's Journey into Day***

“Why does February feel like one big Tuesday?” – Todd Stocker, author and pastor

While we here in Central New York are used to long winters, this season has been longer than most in a very long time ever since it started with a couple of feet of snow the day after Thanksgiving—and has not let up too much since then. So, by the time February rolls around many people are at wit's end (even if they sneaked down to Florida for a week break). Partly that's because we know even though the vernal equinox is next month that does not mean “spring” for us; we will still have snow on the ground.



The church calendar is a bit like that. Christmas seems so long ago and Easter is still far off.

After Epiphany on January 6 (and the end of the season of Christmas), we are back to Ordinary Time until Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the season of Lent. But the date of Ash Wednesday is dependent on when Easter is and Easter is dependent on when the Paschal full moon is. Since that date varies, Easter Day floats between March 22 and April 25. Correspondingly, Ash Wednesday floats (40 regular days + 7 Sundays earlier) between February 4 and March 10. Like this year on February 18, around 72% of the time Ash Wednesday falls in February. But still, that variability can be unsettling. Why can't the dates be more regular, like Thanksgiving is always the fourth Thursday of November? While various reforms have been proposed, tradition dies hard.

But this variability is not random. The date for Easter is quite predictable—just not something you can do in your head. God is like this somewhat. God's actions aren't random, just not something we can set our watch to. While this can also be unsettling, it should also give us hope because we know as Christians that God is active in the world and in our lives. And it should also humble us that cannot put God in a box because as Jesus told his disciples in Acts 1:7, “It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority.”

So, what are we to do? Well, the lectionary readings after Epiphany focus on Jesus's calling of disciples, the unfolding of his public ministry, and the dawning of God's light and salvation through him, leading from his Baptism (the first Sunday after Epiphany) to his Transfiguration (the Sunday before Ash Wednesday), showing how Christ's glory is revealed and calling believers to live out their own baptisms in preparation for Lent. The purpose then is to move from the manifestation of Christ (Epiphany) to the understanding and living out of his ministry. That is, it is for us to prepare ourselves for Lent by strengthening our baptismal covenant and focusing on Jesus as the light and way of salvation. For while the winter nights are long, we do see the light of day increasing daily. And that is one sign of hope to fortify us to the dawn of spring.

We then enter Lent on Ash Wednesday with ashes placed on our foreheads symbolizing our mortality and repentance (“ashes to ashes, dust to dust”). And we begin our journey to reflect, repent, and spiritually renew, drawing closer to Christ by detaching from worldly things. In that vein people often give up something like desserts, alcohol, or screen time. The value in doing so, though, should be to cause you to reflect: How dependent am I on drawing happiness from worldly things? How grateful am I that I have the luxury of giving up something temporarily when so many have no choice and are forced to do without indefinitely? What should I change to become more Christlike? This is also reflected in the traditional practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

We also will kick off our five-week ecumenical Lenten Study sponsored by the Clinton Area Ministerium on Wednesday 2/26/2026 at St. Mary's school starting with our traditional soup supper at 6:00 p.m. With the theme this year of “Faith and Imagination” Father Dan Caruso of St. Mary's appropriately enough will start us off with “Lenten Hymns and Prayers.” It is not only a joy for us of different denominations to come together to search for Christ together but also vital as literally essential for life. Because in this hyper factionalized country we now live in, it is more important than ever that we come together as a \*community\* of believers. Not without our differences, but united in seeking to be the light that draws others to Christ by our example of living Christ-like lives, that is, a life lived by letting love shape every choice you make, especially when it costs you something.

So let us go forth with lives that are compassionate, self-giving, and courageous.

Dwight thinks he will be done in time for our February 1<sup>st</sup> service in the sanctuary; it will be close!

## **SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS – DECEMBER 9TH 2025**

- Pastor Scott Leonard officiated wedding of Victoria Cardillo and Fran Barres at 2:30 p.m., Wednesday 12/31/25 at Stone Church. This included snow shoveling 12/30/25 for the rehearsal along with Lee Kelso, John Menard, and Helen Leonard, and then again on 12/31/25. Donna Goodfriend helped secure 42 candles the couple had set up on the dais in addition to the dozen along the aisles. The wedding ceremony was about half an hour. They took pictures afterward for an hour and a half.
- Pastor Scott conducted funeral for Warren Evans at Stone Church, Friday 12/12/25. 10:00 a.m. calling hours, 11:00 a.m. service
- Good turnout Christmas Eve Service approx. 85.
- The church received a letter dated December 18, 2025 from Thomas Wattles, Clerk of Session, from First Presbyterian Church of Utica. They voted to dismiss Kay and Matthew Blancovich and family from the congregation's roll of membership by their request. By this letter all shall know that, as of the effective date of dismissal, Kay Matthew, and family were members in full communion and in good standing with First Presbyterian Redeemer Church in Scotia, NY. They are now dismissed and affectionately recommended to the fellowship of Stone Presbyterian Church. As of 1/01/2026 Kay and Matthew Blancovich were added to our membership list.
- Clerk Sherry Robinson received an email 1/09/26 from Stated Clerk Larry Beasley sharing the Presbytery of Utica 2026 Pastoral Compensation Memorandum that was voted and approved by the Committee on Ministry for compensation for 2026. The memorandum defining those standards was attached and forwarded to Treasurer Christine Menard for review.
- On 1/09/26 an email was received from Larry Beasley to Moderators and Clerks attached with a 2026 prayer calendar for the Presbytery of Utica. He asked that we forward to the person in our congregation that is responsible for communication. Sherry will forward the email to Officer Manager Janice LeFrois to make sure she has this calendar.
- On 1/07/26 a text was received from Janice LeFrois, asking if I had any information on the sexual harassment class for them to take. Sherry advised that she did not, but did google search and found a couple of free classes. Previously Christine Menard assisted us with this task. She was going to google sexual harassment course herself. Christine Menard thought Janice found a course to take.
- On 1/12/26 both Pastor Scott and Sherry received an email from Michelle Dolan our COM Representative. She wondered if she could invite herself to one of our meetings in March or April. Sherry will email her back to notify her that the course in March would be good with us.
- John Menard talked with Dwight Dibble today regarding the beams and the white wall in the sanctuary that is peeling, scaffolding will put up tomorrow so he can work on it. The crying room needs to be painted too. The outside light timer is broken, these lights are on the front doors and the rose window, Dwight will do some research on the timer and see if it can be fixed.
- Donna Goodfriend applied for the mission grant from the Presbytery of Utica to fix the floor in one of the Fair-Trade Shop rooms, but not knowing how much the grant will provide, she asked where would the difference come from. She has a quote of \$5,000. We can talk with Lauralyn Kolb for ideas and also ask the congregation if need be.
- Lora Schilder agreed to two more years as elder (she was installed 2/2025), class of 2028, Rosalie Wadsworth will come on board and serve as session member-install 2/2026, class of 2029. John Menard and Sherry Robinson will come back on session (to be installed 2/2026), class of 2029.
- Barb Green, Judy LaGasse, Trisha Harris staying on another term as deacons-install 2/2023, class of 2029. Bev Miller moved away in November. Scott Leonard received an email from Mary Ann Stiefvater due to health issues she needs to take time off of session, her term is up 2027, but we will regrettfully remove her from session this January 2026. Donna Goodfriend will follow up with John Stiefvater as he may need the time to care for Mary Ann and might also want to come off of session until further notice as well.

## **DEACONS CORNER**

### **THE HEART**



The heart symbol is a universal representation of love and affection, especially prominent on Valentine's Day, symbolizing deep emotional connections and romantic sentiments.

The heart shape as a symbol of love has a rich history that dates back to the medieval period. Initially, the heart symbol did not represent love. It was used decoratively. However, as the concept of romantic love evolved in the 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> centuries, the heart began to be associated with emotions and affection. This shift was influenced by the idea that the heart was the seat of feelings and passion, as noted by medieval scholars. The first known non-medical illustration of a heart in a love context appeared in a poem around 1255.

Today, the heart symbol is ubiquitous on Valentine's Day, appearing on cards, decorations and gifts. The heart symbol transcends cultures and is recognized as a representation of love. It is often depicted in red, symbolizing passion and desire, and is frequently accompanied by other symbols of love, such as Cupid and roses.

In the world of technology today, we use emojis when sending an email or a text, and the heart is one of the most common ones we use. We already stated that the red heart represents passion and romance. Did you know that the yellow heart represents friendship and happiness, the green one represents nature/health, blue for trust and peace, purple for admiration/compassion, black for dark humor/mourning and white for purity/sympathy.

In summary, the heart symbol's meaning on Valentine's Day is deeply rooted in historical and cultural contexts. We hope you all have a wonderful Valentine's Day filled with love, affection, and emotional connections as we celebrate this special day.
