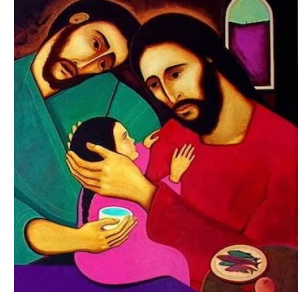

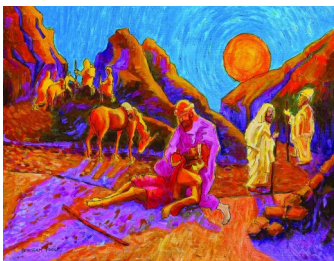

THE PASTOR'S

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Make the Best of It.

“It’s always wrong to hate, but it’s never wrong to love.” — Lady Gaga

June is full of culminations and commencements. In CNY it is the culmination (i.e., peak and final stage) of high school education with commencement ceremonies (i.e., the beginning of new chapter). It is also the culmination of daylight hours, peaking on June 21 (i.e., the summer solstice), while ironically the commencement of summer vacation is a week later for school kids when the days are already starting to get shorter!

Like all months, June also has a number of celebrations and commemorations. In Alabama June 1st is a state holiday commemorating the birthday of Jefferson Davis, the president of the Confederate States of America. This is in juxtaposition to June 19th when we celebrate Juneteenth, a holiday to commemorate the effective end of slavery in the United States. It marks the day in 1865 when Union troops arrived in Galveston, Texas, to enforce the Emancipation Proclamation, freeing the last enslaved people in the state. It has been celebrated in the African-American community since 1866 and became the latest federal holiday in 2021.

Then we have Pride Month, a month-long observance dedicated to celebrating LGBTQ+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, and more) culture, history, and visibility. It is held in June as a way to commemorate the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in New York City, promote civil rights and equality, and remember those lost to hate crimes and the AIDS epidemic. The impetus for the observance began in the early morning of June 28, 1969 when police raided the Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in New York City’s Greenwich Village. Fed up with years of systemic police harassment, the bar’s patrons and local neighborhood residents fought back. The initial raid triggered six days of intense protests and clashes with law enforcement along Christopher Street. Initially, there was an annual day of remembrance that expanded over the decades expanded to being the whole month. The transition to an official national observance took place in 1999, when President Bill Clinton officially declared June as Gay and Lesbian Pride Month. In 2011, President Barack Obama expanded this official designation to recognize the entire LGBT community. In 2021, President Biden expanded and updated the federal proclamation to “LGBTQ+ Pride Month”.

While the general public has had a growing, if almost grudging, acceptance of homosexuality since the Stonewall Uprising and the AIDS epidemic, and broadening to gender and sexual minorities in general, there continues to be a strong backlash by some people and religious sects as being immoral. While there are a few verses in the New Testament discussing sexual immorality, scholars debate how to interpret them. Wanton lust, adultery, and predatory sexual behavior, such as non-consensual sex and exploitation of young boys are more the point than worrying about gender pe se. Further, the terms and (binary) definitions of “homosexuality” versus “heterosexuality” did not arise until the end of the 19th century with the new field of psychiatry.

Notably, Jesus himself says nothing about same-sex relationships. His ministry focused on the marginalized, the vulnerable, and the outcasts of society. Specifically, the economically impoverished, the social outcasts, the sick, women and children, and foreigners. Jesus sought empathy and justice for people being exploited by the rich and powerful and neglected by the general public. He advocated not just for treating people better but for systemic changes that caused these people to be marginalized in the first place.

Some people ask, “Why do we need Black History Month or Gay Pride Month?” And the answer is, “Why indeed?” In fact, why do we have a Women’s History Month in March also? Because if these groups enjoyed the same rights, privileges, and public acceptance in all walks of life, we wouldn’t need to highlight their struggles and progress.

The theme of Ordinary Time in the liturgical calendar that we are in until Advent is Christian discipleship and spiritual growth in everyday life. Rather than focusing on major feasts like Christmas or Easter, the season invites believers to reflect on the teachings and public ministry of Jesus, applying them to the rhythm of daily life. Jesus used his power and authority to heal people physically and spiritually and to challenge the systems of oppression. He did this day in and day out for his time on earth and he commanded us who would be his followers to do the same.

We struggle to answer, “What would Jesus do that I can imitate it?” We don’t always get it right and as a people often have gotten it wrong, but as essayist Maya Angelou wrote, “We do the best we can with what we know, and when we know better, we do better.”

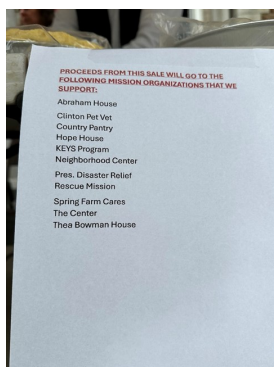
BIBLE STUDY AT STONE PRESBYTERIAN

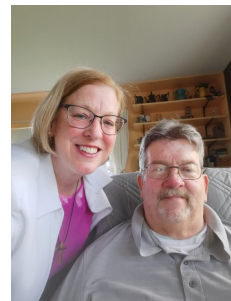
Women of Worship Award Goes To...Sherry Robinson!!

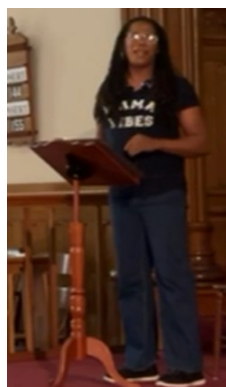

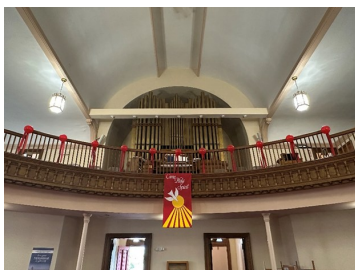
MIDGE BAKOS RECOGNIZED

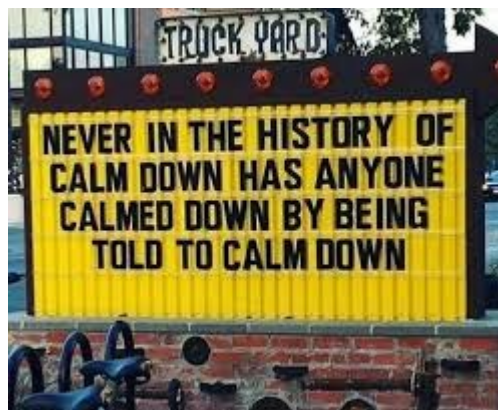

COMMUNITY COLLECTION DAY & BAKE SALE 5/9/26

While chilly with intermittent light rain, the weather for our 11th annual Clinton Community Collection Day on Saturday 5/9/26 was a notch better than last year and didn't dampen our spirits! It is wonderful to have members of a community come together to help members of a community! It was timely as the next food distribution was Monday 5/18/26, so this really helped as The Country Pantry now serves over 600 families every month.

Many thanks also to all for the wonderful baked goods donated to the Community Collection bake sale, which included bakers at St. James, St. Mary's, Clinton United Methodist Church and Stone Church.

Mary Zimbler was very appreciative. We received monetary donations of \$2,020, which included \$886 from the bake sale at the church. In 2025 we collected ~\$1,600 total. The total count for food items was 2,672, which included all three CCS buildings that collected food the previous week; we probably collected a couple of hundred at the event.
