R***Watershed Moment***

In the 17th and 18th centuries, hydrology—the study of the distribution and movement of water both on and below the earth’s surface—developed as a science. At the beginning of the 19th century, the Germans developed the concept of “Wasser-scheide”, which literally means “water-divide.” The British directly translated that as “Water-sched”, which became “watershed.” The term literally meant a high point, or ridge, from which water sheds to either side, such as a mountain range that sends waters to different river areas or seas.” In North America, though, it came to mean the area of land itself that drains all the streams and rainfall to a common outlet. Thus, it shifted across the Atlantic from the drainage divide itself to the entire drainage basin. By the mid-19th century, English speakers began extending “watershed” from its literal geographic sense into figurative contexts describing decisive historical or social turning points. In this usage, the idea of a physical divide was mapped onto events that separated one phase of time from another, creating a clear distinction between “before” and “after.” By 1920 “watershed moment” emerged as an idiom referring to a precise event or instant that functions as a decisive dividing point.

This year in May 2026, we celebrate in worship three “watershed moments”, all in one spirited month: Ascension, Pentecost, and Trinity Sunday! This month gives us a rare liturgical trifecta, a movement from Christ’s commissioning, to the Holy Spirit’s arrival, to the deep mystery of God’s own nature. This series of Sundays is not just a lectionary quirk but an invitation to remember who we are, who God is, and what it means to be witnesses in this time and place. It’s easy to let these moments slip by unnoticed in the busy-ness of spring and summer.

After his resurrection on Easter Sunday, Jesus walked the earth, appearing to his disciples, initially the 11 remaining from his inner circle, but also others (1 Corinthians 15:6) and “speaking about the kingdom of God” (Acts 1:3). He also was assuring them, though, that they would not be alone but that “the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I have said to you” (John 14:26). Then after 40 days, Jesus ascended to heaven. Though it occurs on a Thursday (May 21st this year), we tend to celebrate it as part of the seventh Sunday of the Easter season (May 24th this year).

On the 50th (*pentekoste* in Greek) day after the Resurrection, the Holy Spirit came in the form of “tongues, as of fire”, upon the followers of Jesus who were gathered together in Jerusalem (Acts 2:3). Peter then proclaims that the Good News (gospel) of Jesus Christ is for all the people of Israel. Later on, Peter (thanks to God) will proclaim the gospel is for all people (Acts 10), arguably another watershed moment. Nonetheless, for our church calendar, we celebrate Pentecost as “the birthday of the church” and the close of the Easter season with the descent of the Holy Spirit after the ascension of the risen Christ.

We then begin the six months of Ordinary Time, so called because the weeks are numbered with ordinal numbers (first, second, third, etc.) of weeks after Pentecost. As a “kickoff”, we celebrate the First Sunday after Pentecost as Trinity Sunday where we proclaim the mystery of our faith in the triune God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; One-in-Three and Three-in-One. Trinity Sunday, in a sense, synthesizes all we have celebrated over the past months which have centered on God’s mighty acts: Christmas-Epiphany celebrating God’s taking flesh and dwelling among us in Jesus Christ; Easter celebrating Christ’s death and resurrection for us; and Pentecost celebrating God the Holy Spirit becoming our Sanctifier, Guide, and Teacher. It is, therefore, a fitting transition to that part of the year when Sunday by Sunday the work of God among us is unfolded in a more general way in our ordinary lives.

These three events are watershed moments of our faith, the turning points of Jesus followers going from being disciples (students) to apostles (sent messengers), from experiencing the faith just for themselves to proclaiming the faith for all. So, what if we treated these three watershed moments as opportunities to preach and practice the fullness of the gospel? What if, instead of coasting into Ordinary Time, we allowed these high holy days to energize and shape our faith communities for the “ordinary” season ahead where we focus on living out the gospel not just on Sundays but in our daily lives? After all, we are witnesses of these things—so let us bear witness with joy, creativity, and courage.

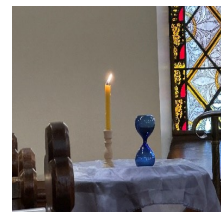

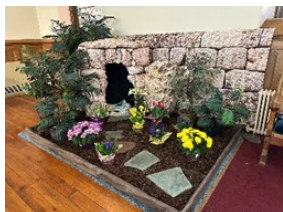

(LutheranCare) for participating in the service—and for Utica Coffee being open afterwards, which Pastor Scott and the Hamilton College students took advantage of!

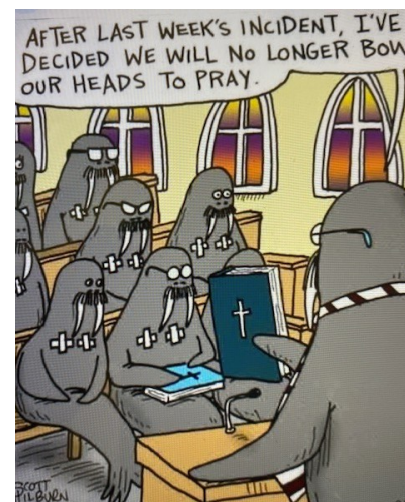

At the market, purchases are tallied up on paper and you can use a calculator if you wish. You can also enjoy the fresh air for a few hours and meet lots of new people as well as old friends. Because summer brings more visitors to the village, the downstairs shop sees more foot traffic, too. You can learn-or relearn-using the cash register or you can simply help out by welcoming customers, answering questions, keeping the shop tidy, or restocking merchandise.
